The program consists of a three-hour workshop (Dinner is included!), followed by a practicum (approximately two hours). Sharing Science is open to Ph.D. and Master's students in STEM-related fields as well as the social sciences, and 15 graduate students will be selected. ## "So Tell Me About Your Research..." An Elevator Pitch Workshop for Graduate Students

Can you summarize your research or scholarly work in three minutes or less? Can you explain it to a ten-year old? If you have answered "No" to either of these questions you may need to work on your "elevator pitch."

An elevator pitch is a concise, effective description about you and your research or scholarly work and can help you create a positive first impression. From a 30 second personal introduction at a conference to a three minute research presentation, the elevator pitch comes in many forms and is an essential skill for graduate students to master.

The Graduate School teams with Les Craig of the Blackstone LaunchPad to present this dynamic hands-on workshop. Mr. Craig will review key elements of an elevator pitch and participants will learn how to tailor theirs to a variety of audiences. There will be several chances to practice delivering your elevator pitch.
