Learning outcomes: 1) to become acquainted with the major themes of the New Testament.

- 2) to become acquainted with some of the critical scholarly tools used in the interpretation and study of the New Testament in an academic setting.
- 3) to become acquainted with the historical backgrounds and cultural setttings out of which the religion and views presented in the New Testament emerged.
- 4) to learn to read, examine, and discuss the New Testament as an academic text and as a means of examining the development of western religious thought.

The specific days and times that each assignment is due are listed below in the weekly schedule. There will be **no extensions** on papers or assignments unless arrangements have been made at least one week in advance.

There are **FIVE short writing assignments** throughout the semester; only **FOUR** of them will count toward your final grade—you may choose to not write one of them; if you write all of them the lowest grade for the semester will be dropped.

A half a letter grade will be deducted per day for late papers and assignments; no assignment more than two days late will be accepted.

The **final exam** for this course will be in two parts. A **take-home essay question** will be handed out in class and due on. In addition, there will be an **in-class final exam**, written during regular class time on. The final will be comprehensive for the semester.

Course Policies:

- 1) This is a course about religion as an academic subject and the development of religious thought. This is **NOT** a class that teaches religion, faith, or religious doctrine nor is it a class that is taught from a religious and/or faith-based perspective. In this class, we will be examining the New Testament in **an academic and secular setting**, and **treating the biblical text as material open to questioning, examination, criticism, and interpretation**. An open mind and a willingness to examine new ideas and new methods of examining the biblical text are essential. **This class is not a forum for expressions of personal theology.**
- 2) Plagiarism the presentation of others' work as your own is an offense punishable by expulsion. All work submitted in this class must be your own, and all references to ideas from books, articles, or other sources must be cited correctly. If you do not know how to properly reference your work, or you are in doubt whether or not you should cite material, refer to the *Student Academic and Conduct Guidelines*, or make an appointment to see the instructor to discuss the problem. Anyone found guilty of plagiarism, cheating, forgery, falsification or any other form of academic dishonesty will fail this course and the incident will be reported to the Dean of Students.
