Description: This course will investigate Hinduism from a range of academic perspectives. The material will be organized historically—from early Vedic culture to contemporary Hindu religiosity and its impact on Indian society. Since the category of Hinduism encompasses such a wide range of material, this course will focus on specific themes such as sacrifice, asceticism, philosophy, devotion, and gender.

Goals: Through successful completion of this course, student will be able to:

- Explain main themes and concepts related to the development of Hinduism
- Identify and interpret Hindu iconography
- Critically analyze primary source material
- Demonstrate knowledge of main terms and concepts in Hinduism
- Engage crucial themes in modern Hindu traditions
