HISTORY 102: AMERICAN HISTORY II (AMERICA SINCE THE CIVIL WAR)

<u>Focus of the Course</u>: This is a course about American history since the end of the Civil War. The overarching focus of the course is the reconstruction of the American nation-state and its rise to the position of a global superpower in a remarkably short period of time. We will examine the forces that have united Americans as well as those that have put them at cross-purposes with themselves and, sometimes, with other nations. This course is about history, but it invites you to think about the future of America in the world.

<u>Course Requirements</u>: You are responsible for materials covered in lectures, discussions, and readings. These are <u>not</u> identical course components. Rather lectures are designed to supplement the assigned readings and discussions are intended to probe more deeply into specific assignments. Attendance at lectures and discussions is required and all assignments must be completed to obtain a passing grade. Should you miss a class it is *your responsibility* to obtain notes, etc. from another student. Attendance at recitation meetings is especially important and required; if you miss more than four of these meetings without an acceptable reason, you will likely *not* receive credit for this course even if you complete the other assignments. There will be two short papers (750-800 words in length), an in-class midterm, an in-class final exam; and, occasional quizzes as necessary. The papers and midterm together will count for about 40% of your grade, the in-class final exam 40%, and class participation (including quizzes) about 20%. PLEASE NOTE: Because of past student complaints about electronic devices (laptops, phones, etc), these are *not* to be used in lecture or recitation sections unless you have special authorization from your instructor. Also, this course does *not* use D2L.
