What is the Global Studies Minor?

The Global Studies Minor is a multi-disciplinary minor designed to develop a broad base of international knowledge for students in any major at Montana State University. The minor provides a well-rounded and balanced introduction to international studies. It brings together international learning opportunities across the campus and around the world to provide the foundation for an international career.

Who should consider the Global Studies Minor?

Students in any major preparing for any profession can benefit from the Global Studies Minor if they are interested in an international career or want to understand their field in a global context. It is a good choice for students who want to stand out from others in their fields as being a global thinker and professional. The minor also provides a base for students to be informed citizens in today's world characterized by expanding global relationships.

How will the Global Studies Minor benefit me?

The Global Studies Minor provides a way for you to stand out from others in the field in which you want to build a career as someone with the interest, the knowledge, and the experience to function effectively in today's increasingly borderless careers. In addition, it provides guidance in developing a broad foundation of international knowledge upon which to build and develop global competence. Of course, fulfilling the Global Studies Minor is also just interesting and fascinating, providing you with a great window onto the rich diversity and complexity of the world's nations and cultures.

What is required by the Global Studies Minor?

The Global Studies Minor requires students to:

- develop a base of international knowledge by completing several courses with substantial, contemporary international content selected from a large list of elective options
- demonstrate proficiency in a modern foreign language by successfully completing at least the first semester of the second year of the language, and
- complete an education abroad experience.

Why is foreign language study required for the Global Studies Minor?

Proficiency in a foreign language(s) is important to success internationally and Montana State University strongly believes in the importance of learning foreign languages as a major component of international competence. While English is widely spoken around the world, it is a serious limitation to effective international communication to be a monolingual English speaker. In addition, gaining proficiency in at least one foreign language is highly beneficial in learning how other cultures think and what they believe.

Why is an education abroad component required for the Global Studies Minor?

No amount of course work on the MSU campus can substitute for direct experience living and studying in another country. Only through direct experience of another culture can students gain an appreciation of cultural differences, the challenges of intercultural communication, and even understand themselves as products of U.S. culture. In addition, education abroad experience is one of the things that employers focus on in trying to identify people who can work effectively for them in the global marketplace.

How can the education abroad requirement be fulfilled?

The education abroad component is very flexibly designed so that a wide array of programs abroad can be used to satisfy the requirement. The ideal way to fulfill the requirement is through a full year of study at one of MSU's international partner campuses around the world, through which most, if not all, of the Global Studies Minor can be completed. However, semester programs also provide great long learning opportunities and all MSU-sponsored programs satisfy the education abroad requirement. In addition, many shorter-term faculty-led study abroad experiences will satisfy the education abroad requirement, but these are approved on a case-by-case In addition, international internships and research can also satisfy the requirement, but must also be approved on a case-by-case basis.

Requirements for the Global Studies Minor

International Coursework

All students must complete at least 14 semester hours of courses with substantial, contemporary international content.

- A list of MSU courses that satisfy the requirement is provided below.
- All students must complete the Global Studies Minor Capstone Seminar as part of this requirement. However, if the Seminar is not available, students may substitute Intercultural Studies Individual Problems (ICS 470), working individually with a member of the faculty on an appropriate global or international subject.
- Courses must be completed with a grade of C or higher.
- No more than 5 hours of credit below the 200 level can apply to fulfilling this requirement.
- Courses completed while studying abroad may be used to satisfy this requirement provided that the course(s) has substantial contemporary (19th/21st century) international content and the course(s) were not used to satisfy the minor's education abroad or foreign language requirements (see below).
- Courses used to fulfill the foreign language proficiency requirement cannot be used to fulfill this requirement, except students who must take a first year course(s) to fulfill the foreign language proficiency requirement can apply one of these courses toward fulfilling the international coursework requirement.
- No more than 1 course (3 credit maximum) used to satisfy requirements for the major may be applied to fulfill the international course requirement.

Foreign Language Proficiency

All students must complete a modern foreign language through the first semester of the second year or demonstrate equivalent proficiency.

- The requirement can be fulfilled by completing the first semester of the second year or higher of any university-level modern language course with a grade of C or higher.
- Students can fulfill the requirement by demonstrating to the MSU Modern Language Department that they have attained proficiency equivalent to the first semester of the second year of language study.
- Foreign students whose native language is not English are deemed to have fulfilled the foreign language proficiency requirement.
- Students needing to complete the first year prerequisites in a modern foreign language in order to complete the requirement may apply up to three credits from these courses to satisfy the international coursework requirement.
- Students who must take a first year language course(s) to fulfill this requirement can count one of these courses toward fulfilling the international coursework requirement.
- Otherwise students cannot apply credits that are used to fulfill the education abroad or international coursework requirement to fulfill this requirement.

Education Abroad

All students must complete at least 6 credits in an approved education abroad program.

- Credits earned on any MSU-sponsored semester or academic year study abroad program will fulfill the requirement.
- Credit from MSU-sponsored, faculty-led study abroad programs that have been approved by the International Programs Committee to fulfill the requirement can also be used to fulfill the requirement.
- Credits from academically supervised internships or research conducted abroad can be applied to fulfill the requirement if approved by the MSU International Programs Committee.
- Credits used to fulfill the international coursework or the foreign language proficiency requirements cannot be used to fulfill this requirement.

Overall

As required by Montana University System policy, at least nine credits used to fulfill the above requirements must be at the 300 level or above.
