## Student Responsibilities

#### DegreeWorks and MyInfo

• Familiarize yourself with your DegreeWorks and MyInfo accounts to understand your progress toward graduation.

#### Deadlines

• Understand important deadlines for each semester – last day to drop/add classes, refund schedule, withdrawal schedule.

#### Registration and Advising

 To register for classes each semester, you'll need to meet with your assigned academic advisor to choose classes and receive your registration pin.

#### • Speak up

• If anything is confusing or does not sound right, please make sure to ask. We are always here to help and answer questions.



## Things to Consider


#### **Scholarships**

• If you have a scholarship, be sure to understand the requirements. Most scholarships require students to attempt 30 credits per year.

#### **Timeline**

- 15 credits per semester is ideal for students to graduate on a 4-year timeline.
- Do not exceed 5 classes this Fall. If you feel that 5 classes is too much, come speak with an advisor.

## Advisor Responsibilities

"Academic advising at MSU is a collaborative process between students, faculty, and professional advisors designed to empower students to discover who they are as learners, where their academic interests lie, and how their University experience will shape their lives."

**Engage in the advising process.** 

Be knowledgeable about academic policies, procedures, and deadlines.


Facilitate student understanding of policies and major requirements

Maintain student confidentiality.

Hold advising hours by drop-in or appointment, assist with registration, and follow up on appointments.

## **History Concentrations**

#### History Option

- Classes are split into categories American History, European History, World History, and Upper Division (300/400) History Classes.
- Students are required to take either two semesters of a modern language or 9 additional upper division history credits.

#### History Teaching Option

- Similar to the English Teaching slide from before, students take a mixture of education classes and history classes.
- Students will be certified to teach History to grades 5-12.





### **History Concentrations**

- SETS
  - Science, the Environment, Technology and Society
  - Multi-disciplinary course of study that analyzes the above in context of history
  - Work closely with a faculty advisor to choose a concentration and courses.

## Philosophy

- One concentration
  - Serves as a basis for further study post graduation.
  - Students move on to study more philosophy (graduate level), law, religion, or other related fields.
  - One year of foreign language required

## **Important Things to Know**

- You will need 120 credits to graduate from MSU.
   42 of these credits need to be 300/400 level classes.
- The History and Philosophy department assigns faculty advisors beginning first semester Freshman year. This is the person you will work with to plan for future semesters.
- History Teaching major classes must be passed with a "C" grade or better. CORE classes must be passed with a "C-" or better.





## Important Things to Know

- AP or Dual Credit from high school may cover some of your major or CORE requirements. MSU will need the official transcript to accept these credits. Speak with an advisor if you are confused about AP/Dual Credit.
- If you earned 15+ AP or Dual Credits from high school, speak with an advisor to see if your graduation timeline can be moved up.
