UPDATE: What You Need to Know About Your FAFSA



- Awards for the 2024-25 school year should be sent to students between April 15-30.
- The Department of Education is currently sending FAFSA applications to colleges for processing.
- If you know you made a mistake on your application, don't stress! The opportunity to make corrections will be available in the next two weeks.
- If you want Work-Study next year, you will need to talk directly with the Financial Aid Office as all Work-Study is being run through the colleges this year.
- If you need help doing the FAFSA, the <u>Office of Financial Education is happy to assist</u>. It is not too late to do the application! OFE is also happy to help you start budgeting for next year.
- Cat Scholarships are being processed. Scholarships which require a FAFSA application may be delayed, but others are being awarded. Scholarship renewals in College of Engineering and College of Agriculture are being processed.
