## **New Reports/Resources**

#### New Housing Increases Fastest in the Exurbs

The map below shows the change in the number of housing units in every rural and exurban county. Green counties had the largest increase in the number of dwellings; red counties had the largest decline. Coastal counties gained the most new rural housing between 2000 and 2008. But for the real growth in the housing stock outside the cities, look to the exurbs. The Census report for Montana housing is most certainly misleading. Contrary to what the map shows, Montana did not suffer a wholesale loss of housing. The map correctly reports the official Census findings. But there is a flaw in the Bureau's methods when it comes to that state. The Census bureau relies on a number of components to track the number of housing units, including building permits. Many Montana cities do require permits and they are counted by the Census. Rural counties, however, do not generally require building permits, so their housing is undercounted.



#### Change in Rural Housing Units: 2000 to 2008





#### Report: Wind-Generated Power Grew 39% in 2009

After a dramatic gain in 2009 in wind-generated power, the United States is closing in on getting 2 percent of its power from wind. As reported in the New York Times, the American Wind Energy Association released its <u>annual report</u>, which states the amount of capacity added last year, 9,900 megawatts, was the largest on record, and was 18 percent above the capacity added in 2008, also a banner year. Featured in the report, the graphics below show the U.S.'s Annual and Cumulative Wind Power Installation and Cumulative Wind Capacity by State.

#### Ranking the Entrepreneurial States: South Dakota Down to DC

South Dakota was recently named the most entrepreneur friendly state in the Small Business Survival put out each year by the Small Business & Entrepreneurship Council, Montana ranked 31st. The 2009 edition again ranks the policy environment of all 50 states plus the District of Columbia - which again the power of volunteers to improve finished last. The fourteenth annual index examines 36 major government-imposed or government-related costs impacting small businesses and entrepreneurs -- with a heavy emphasis on various tax rates (e.g. for up to \$2,500 in the form of The personal, corporate, capital gains, property, sales) and regulatory costs.


