heridan County is located in northeast Montana, with Plentywood, the county seat, located approximately 18 miles south of the Montana/Canada border and 24 miles west of the Montana/North Dakota border. The Montana Legislature established Sheridan County in 1913 from portions of Dawson and Valley Counties. It was named for American Civil War General Philip Sheridan. The Medicine Lake National Wildlife Refuge is located just south of the Town of Medicine Lake.

MSU Extension works in partnership with Sheridan County, Montana State University and the United States Department of Agriculture. Through the strength of this partnership, Extension agents provide research-based education programs to county residents in the areas of Agriculture/Natural Resources, 4-H Youth Development, Community Development and Family and Consumer Science.

Livestock Judging Team Places in Top Ten at Montana State 4-H Congress

Sheridan County 4-H members attended the Montana 4-H Congress in July of 2022. Three members of Sheridan County 4-H traveled to Bozeman to compete in the state

Making bread with the Fifth Grade North Dakota Bread Fair

In April, Sheridan County MSU Extension partnered with North Dakota State University Extension and Plentywood Schools to host the North Dakota Bread Fair. During the event, students used a kit provided by NDSU Extension to make their own loaf of honey wheat bread using local ingredients from just over the state line in North Dakota. These fifth graders had a fantastic time learning how to make bread and how the crops grown in the region become integral parts of the foods they eat every day.
