- 9. Ideals, objectives and outstanding accomplishments In Miss Bessie E. McClelland's own words in her Epsilon Sigma Phi Annalist's report she stated that her obective in Extension work was, "To help people have greater health, happiness and efficiency." All her efforts both as Nutritionist and as State Leader of Home Economics Extension were devoted to this goal.

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When she came to Montana the rural areas were still suffering from depression. her work was directed to helping families obtain better health and fuller lives with the little which they had.

By the forties rapid changes occurred. The process of drying fruits and vegetables was perfected. She had everyone drrying. The freezing of products came into being and the establishment of Freezer Locker Plants. Her untiring efforts not only with the rural people but also with the plant operators quickly made the process acceptable and safe. Her ability to work with men had no small part in this. She often laughs over one operator. The products in his plant were spoiling. The cause was indiscernable until Miss McClelland's tactful investigation inadvertently uncovered the fact that the operator turned off the current week ends in order to save electricity.

When the war came the State Leader, Frances Smith, turned over the training and guidance of emergency agents for the war effort to Miss McClelland. Her abilities as an administrator became evident. The women not only did an efficient job but later all but one became permanent Extension Agents.

As State Leader she not only handled the myriad details of the office and gave her agents backing and support but also expanded and consolidated the program of County, District, and State Home Demonstration Councils. Under her guidance rural women developed a capacity for leadership and responsibility.

All of her Extension Agents, as well as the women of the rural areas revered, loved and were loyal to her. She never failed to give them comfort in sickness and counsel in difficulties. She frequently saw that a woman was transfered to another county if the new position would offer greater possibilities for her capabilities. Further she gave Home Economic majors at the College council and was quick to recognize girls with aptitude for Extension work. She was highly regarded by her peers in the Land Grant Association and held many resposible chairmanships there.

Perhaps nothing shows her worth more than a statement from Louise Shunk when she took the reins at Bess McClelland's retirement. Louise said, " I did not realize how much Bess did until I tried to follow her." All this Bess did with quiet humbleness and humor.
