We will ship in the pigs for the club members in so far as possible for there is a scarcity of pigs in the county and one object of the club project is to increase the number of hogs in the county.

Poultry

Five pooltry culling demonstrations were conducted in as many different communities in the county. The total attendance at the demonstrations was sixty-three.

Quite a large number of requests have been made for information relative to poultry feeding, houseing, and disease control.

Outside of the culling work no definite projects have been carried on. The greatest immediate needs for poultry improvement is better housing and next to this we would place the need for better feeding. We hope to be able to interest some

communities in a definite project for poultry improvement.

Prevention of Hairlessness and Goiter.

A four page illustrated circular letter relative to the prevention of hairlessness and goiter in domesticated animals has been ma led to all farmers in the county. In addition to this, posters calling attention to the need for more general use of the method of preventing loss from this trouble have been posted thru out the county.

# (E). Farm Economics

A farm survey will be made in the county this fall to secure records of the farming enterprise on a number of typical farms. These records will be used at the farm management and farm accounting schools to be held during the winter.

One co-operator has been secured who will keep cost accounts of the feeding of a herd of beef cattle. We also expect to secure one or more co-operators to keep cost accounts for the feeding of swine.

(F) Marketing

The Extension Service has co-operated with the Fallon County Seed Potato Growers' Association in trying to locate a southern market for their certified seed potatoes, although we have communicated with a large number of County Agents in the southern states we have so far been unable to find a market where the Association could sell direct to large growers or to growers Association?

## (C) Farm Home Betternent

#### Home Conveniences

Home convenience meetings were planned as a part of the program of work for the women in five organized communities. Due to the fact that the State Specialist was unable to be present on the dates set for this series of meetings this project has so far not been carried out. We will, however, hold these meetings at a later date.

### Home Cheese-Making

Five demonstrations were held in as many different communities showing how to make cheese on the farm. Two have not reported the amount of cheese made as a result of the demonstration. The reports that have been received show a total of \$61 pounds of cheese made, which they figure at a value of \$152.82. In addition to this, quite a number of homes outside of the communities where the demonstrations were held have been making cheese, following instructions in the bulletin received from the Extension office.

## Canning Demonstrations

Canning demonstrations were held in five organized communities. The reports which have been received from four communities show a total of 1, 521 quarts of vegetables, 634 quarts of fruits, 599 quarts of meat and 31 quarts of dried corn, to have been preserved as a result of these demonstrations. The following products were reported as being preserved in several of the homes for the first time; Greens, asparagus, peas, corn, beans, tomatoes, and beets.

#### Nutrition and Child Welfare

Nutrition and child weffare meetings were held in four communities in the county. These meetings were held very recently, therefore reports received on the project does not indicate results achieved. The report received from these communities shows that three families have changed their their food habits as a result of the nutrition demonstration and seven children in the community are now carrying milk
