On the livestock side, there will be some changes at the 2022 fair in regards to sale eligibility of overweight animals. Please read the details in the newsletter. Looking ahead, swine weigh-in deadline will be April 17, lambs will be May 8. I'd encourage you to talk to your breeders early to get appropriately sized livestock lined up. Also, now is a good time to lock in a processor for your spare animal if you haven't done so already as processing remains tight.

I'm excited to report that we had two Montana 4-H Foundation Innovative Programming grants approved. One grant (\$600) will be for helping 4-Hers learn about value added agriculture through guest speakers and developing their own value added product. The second grant (\$600) is to provide a regional leader training for enrolled and prospective project and organizational areas from the area. If you have ideas for either or would be interested in helping organize, please let me know.

4-H Camp Counselors Needed

4-H camp will be June 13 - 16, 2022 in the Bear Paw's Mountains south of Havre. (Camp may end up being just June 13 - 15, but please save the dates of June 13 - 16 at this point.) Counselors are needed to organize workshops and activities and serve as mentors to the campers. Applications are currently open in ZSuites under 'Events.' The application deadline to apply to be a camp counselor is February 15, 2022.

Qualifications:

- Currently be in 9th thru 12th grade (15-18 years old).
- Enjoy working with children.
- Willing to participate in all counselor-training sessions plus fun-filled days at camp.
- Must be enrolled as a 4-H member and in good standing in your county.



Training Sessions: If you are selected to be a 4-H Camp Counselor, you must attend all camp planning sessions. The dates for these are pending but are typically a Sunday afternoon in late spring.

4-H Camp Interest Survey - Respond by February 11

For the 2022 Multi-County Camp (4-H programs in Glacier, Toole, Pondera, Liberty, Hill, Blaine, Chouteau and Phillips counties) we are trying to estimate potential camper headcounts. Regularly enrolled 4-H youth currently in 7th grade or below would potentially be eligible (no Cloverbuds).

In recent years, we have been at maximum camp capacity and are acknowledging the strong potential for continued growth. We are looking at potential options of either keeping camp as one but modifying the schedule/activities to account for the large group or splitting camp with potentially older members staying two nights and younger members staying one night.

U.S. Targhee Sheep Association Starter Flock

Any young person, ages 9-17, as of January 1, 2022, whose family does not raise Targhee sheep may apply. Applicants should possess a keen interest in the U.S. sheep industry, commitment to raising Targhee sheep over time, and a firm belief in the abilities of the breed. Applicants must demonstrate proof of care, facilities, and transportation. Aside from receiving the flock of sheep, the winning youth, will be paired with a Targhee breeder living near them who will act as a mentor.

Record books

Paper record book paper forms are available from the Extension Office or website, https://glacier.msuextension.org/4H.html OR, you can use ZSuites for online recordkeeping. ZSuites will allow club leaders and the Extension Office to view a member's records, mark them complete or 'needs revision' along with provide comments. These records can also be printed out, if desired. Additional information is available at http://www.montana4h.org/projects/support/record_books/zsuite.html.

Glacier County 4-H has the following items available for 4-H families to check-out for use for project or club meetings, practice at home, etc.

Horse Workshop - February 26

Potential topics include horse projects, horse show information (what to expect at fair), horse care and health, tack and tack care, and more. Record Book Reminder - Goals

Members should have their goals recorded in their record books by the end of December. Remember, a 'My 4-H Year' goal pertains to the ENTIRE 4-H year (example - Attend 4-H camp, attend 75% of club meetings, serve as a club officer, participate in two community service projects, etc.) while a project goal is SPECIFIC to that project (learn the parts of a pig by February 1, lead a halterbreaking workshop for beef members by March 1, learn how to make homemade pie crust, etc.)



Addisyn Bengtson shared with the Marias Fair Livestock Committee about her plans to install a flagpole at the Marias Fair. The American and 4-H flag would be raised and lowered during the fair by county 4-H ambassadors. Addisyn is currently working on a grant for the project and was seeking the Committee's support as a partner. Earlier this month she presented to the Marias Fair board as well.

- Registration opens in Zsuites February 1st and is just \$75! Late registration (March 1 7) is \$125. Members and volunteers will login to their Zsuites profile and click on the event in the calendar or under events and complete the registration. Participants pay the county office and then they county sends Fergus 4-H Council one check for their county registration. Participants will select their workshops during registration. Both the Glacier County 4-H Council Event scholarship and Bret Wanken Memorial Fund scholarships are available to assist with registration cost, forms are available at https://glacier.msuextension.org/4H.html.

Marias Fair 2022 Livestock Rule Changes

The following are rule changes from the Livestock Committee that will be in effect at the 2022 Fair:

- Lamb weight limit Maximum lamb weight limit has been increased to 165 pounds. This is more in line with other fairs and allows those larger framed lambs to be appropriately finished. A heavier carcass also provides the buyer more meat for their fixed processing costs.
- Maximum Sale Participation Weight Any animal weighing 12% or more above the maximum payweight will NOT be eligible to sell in the market livestock sale. Those animals may participate in the show but will not be able to sell. Maximum sale participation weights are:
 - o Beef 1,680
 - Lambs 185
 - Swine 336
 - Goats 123

In summary, Minimum Weight to Sell Maximum Payweight Maximum Sale Participation Weight (12% over maximum payweight)

- Beef must weigh at least 1,100 pounds to sell, maximum payweight is 1,500 pounds, maximum sale participation weight is 1,680 pounds.
- Lambs must weight at least 110 pounds to sell, maximum payweight is 165 pounds, maximum sale participation weight is 185 pounds.
- Swine must weigh at least 220 pounds to sell, maximum payweight is 300 pounds, maximum sale participation weight is 336 pounds.
- Goats must weight at least 70 pounds to sell, maximum payweight is 110 pounds, maximum sale participation weight is 123 pounds.

The Livestock Committee encourages livestock members to choose an appropriate weight animal to start the project, monitor the animal's feed and weight throughout the project, and seek out help from livestock leaders to have an appropriately finished animal at the fair that is of high quality to the livestock buyer.

• Breeding shows - Exhibitors can enter ONLY one entry per class. Exhibitors are encouraged to choose their very best livestock to enter. Additional livestock can be entered in Open Class.

Marias Fair 4-H Air Rifle and Air Pistol Competition

The fair shoot for Air Rifle and Air Pistol will be Sunday, February 27, 2022 at the Pondera Shooting Sports Club in Conrad. Entries must be postmarked by Friday, February 18. Cost per event is \$12/shooter, payment must be included with registration. 4-Hers must complete their Marias Fair interview at the tournament to be eligible for awards or premium points.

Details and registration form are being mailed out with the newsletter, please read through them carefully and complete. If you have questions on which category to enter, please ask the coaches.

Livestock Per Capita Reporting

All Montana livestock owners must report the number of each type of livestock they own on February 1 each year. According to Montana state law (15-24-921, MCA), livestock owners need to report "cattle, sheep, swine, poultry, honey bees, goats, horses, mules, asses, llamas, alpacas, domestic bison, ostriches, rheas, emus, and domestic ungulates." Once reporting is complete, livestock owners pay a per capita fee which funds Department of Livestock programs for monitoring animal health, tracking livestock movement and important, preventing livestock theft, and managing predators. You can report online at https:// app.mt.gov/livestockreporting or by filling out the form at https:// app.mt.gov/myrevenue/Endpoint/Form/151 . 4-H members are considered livestock owners, so will need to report. In the event that a 4-Her loses livestock to wildlife predation, they will only receive reimbursement from the Montana Livestock Loss Board if they previously paid their livestock per capita fees.
