Hopefully you've been taking advantage of this awesome weather to get some work in those 4-H projects.

Thanks to our small animal leaders and members for hosting a successful workshop this month and sharing their project knowledge. Leanne Winkowitsch is working on organizing additional workshops this spring, so please stay tuned and see how you can help (more details inside).

A few updates from the livestock committee meeting - after 17 years as treasurer, Ramona Kinyon has retired and Jacki Boyce has stepped up into the role. A big thank you to these ladies for their willingness to serve! Jeremy Curry remains as President, Jason Wanken is the new Vice-President, and Stefanie Leach remains Secretary. Thanks to Eric Morrisett for his willingness to join the committee as well, we're looking forward to having him on board as well! For those members with breeding projects, there will now be a feeder steer and whether lamb class for the steer calves and whether lambs to show in.

For those with market livestock, I would encourage you to get your processors lined up for processing those spare animals as processing is very tight. Swine weigh-in deadline will be April 11 and lamb weigh-in deadline will be May 9, so now is a good time to line up breeders, etc.

In terms of Covid, please continue to wash your hands, socially distance, and wear a mask. The 25-person limit on groups has been removed per the Governor's order but the remaining Covid-19 Montana 4-H guidelines for meeting are still in effect.

Shooting Sports

Due to the school asking extracurricular activities be paused due to Covid, practices have been temporarily suspended.

Air Rifle practice will tentatively resume on Tuesday, February 9 at 6 p.m. and Archery tentatively resume practice on Thursday, February 11 at 4 p.m.

Tentatively, Archery Group 3 will begin practicing on Sunday, February 28 and Archery Group 4 will begin practicing on Thursday, February 25. They will each have four weekly practice sessions.

Archers should come to the line with face masks on, and then remove as getting ready to shoot. When finished with their

arrows, they should put their masks back on. Rifle members should wear face masks, but remove masks while shooting.

Parli Pro – Did You Know?

Each month we'll try to highlight a tip for helping make club meetings successful. This month focuses on making a motion.

A motion opens an idea up for discussion and will eventually be voted on. When making a motion, one should say, "I move to..." or, "I move that...." A motion must be approved by a second person saying, "I second the motion." Discussion on the motion is then opened up to the group before voting on the motion.

Discussion is an important part of the process before a motion is voted on. What if no one or only a few people will share ideas? The president can call on members for discussion, "Joe, what do you think of...." Members can be divided into small groups to discuss the idea for 3 to 5 minutes, and then report back. The chairman can also call on each person in the circle and the secretary or a couple assistants can jot ideas down on a board.

After there's been adequate discussion, action needs to occur (voting on the main motion). The discussion should help members decide if they want to vote to approve the motion.

For example, Joe may say, "I move we donate \$200 to the Cut Bank Animal Shelter." The motion is seconded and the chairman asks for discussion. Members may then comment on the motion in support of or against the motion. Following discussion, a vote is taken on the main motion.

Montana Livestock Per Capita Reporting

All Montana livestock owners must report the number of each type of livestock they own on February 1 each year. According to Montana state law (<u>15-24-921, MCA</u>), livestock owners need to



report "cattle, sheep, swine, poultry, honey bees, goats, horses, mules, asses, llamas, alpacas, domestic bison, ostriches, rheas, emus, and domestic ungulates." Once reporting is complete, livestock owners pay a per capita fee which funds Department of Livestock programs for monitoring animal health, tracking livestock movement and important, preventing livestock theft, and managing predators. You can report online at https://app.mt.gov/livestockreporting or by filling out the form at https://app.mt.gov/livestockreporting or by filling out the form at https://app.mt.gov/myrevenue/Endpoint/Form/151 . 4-H members are considered livestock owners, so will need to report. In the event that a 4-Her loses livestock to wildlife predation, they will only receive reimbursement from the Montana Livestock Loss Board if they previously paid their livestock per capita fees.

Custer County 4H 2021 Montana Postal Shoot

The Custer County 4H Shooting Sports is excited to host its first annual postal shoot for 4H and Shooting Clubs in Montana! Dates: February 1 – February 26, 2021

(All registration forms, payment, and targets to be scored, must all be postmarked by February 26, 2021 to be eligible.)

Cost: \$10 per shooter per event. Checks payable to Custer County 4H Shooting Sports.

Registration: Complete registration form attached. Shooters may enter as many events as desired. Mail completed registration and payment to address listed.

Rules: Shooters must adhere to the Montana State 4H shooting rules and times.

Scoring: One set of targets will be scored for each event. All targets must be mailed and postmarked by February 26, 2021. Targets will be scored using the Orion System. If you do not have Orion targets for use, targets can be mailed to you. Please contact Jessica Blankenship at 406-853-5985 to request Orion targets. Scored targets will be return mailed to you. Scores will be listed on-line in Orion scoring system under the "Custer County 4H Shooting Sports 2021 Postal Shoot" event. Mail targets to: Jessica Blankenship, 206 N. Earling, Miles City, MT 59301

Awards: Top three finishers in each event and age group. Awards will be mailed March 3, 2021.

<u>Glacier County 4-H Council Event Scholarship</u> - The Glacier County 4-H Council may contribute up to 50% of the cost of attending 4-H teen leadership trainings, workshops, and conferences. Bret Wanken Memorial Fund - This fund was established to help 4-H Youth from the five 4-H programs (Glacier, Liberty, Pondera, and Toole Counties and the Blackfeet Reservation) to attend 4-H teen leadership trainings. Montana 4-H State Awards

Application Deadline to apply for a state award is (postmarked) May 1. Please forward complete applications to Brett Schomer: 210 Taylor Hall PO Box 173580, Bozeman, MT 59717 or <u>bschomer@montana.edu</u>. The Montana 4-H State Awards program is in place to recognize the outstanding accomplishments of 4-H members who have reached a standard of excellence in a project area. State Award winners have gone above and beyond regular project work with a focus on leadership, communication, and community service. State Award recipients are recognized during the Banquet at Montana 4-H Congress in July and are eligible to attend National 4-H Congress in November.

2021 U.S. Targhee Sheep Association (USTSA) Starter Flock Program

This program is to promote growth and visibility of the Targhee breed, and to promote youth involvement and education within the breed. Any youth, age 9 to 17 as of January 1, 2021, whose immediate family does



not raise Targhee sheep is eligible to apply. The winner will be awarded one (1) ewe lamb, one (1) yearling ewe, and one (1) brood ewe donated by members of the USTSA. Each animal will be a USTSA registered animal, and at least QR in scrapie codon 171 genotype. A completed application in addition to the supporting materials must be submitted (postmarked or emailed) to the USTSA Secretary by April 1, 2021.
