Parli Pro - Did You Know?

Each month we'll try to highlight a tip for helping make club meetings successful.

This month focuses on giving a committee report.

Last month, we talked about referring an idea to a committee for a small group of members to research the idea and then report back. At the following meeting, the committee should give a committee report. The committee reports should be given after the secretary's minutes and treasurer's minutes are given, and before Old Business. This allows the committee to give their report and make a motion if they need to.

For example, the Clover Crew 4-H club referred the idea of a community service project to a committee to research. At this month's meeting, the committee reports back. They may give a report similar to this, "Our committee met to brainstorm community service project ideas and research several possibilities. The two we think would work best for our club are making tie blankets for those in the Care Center or organizing a community Easter egg hunt. The blankets would cost \$10 each to make and would help keep the senior citizens warm. For the Easter egg hunt we would need to get candy donated for plastic eggs, advertise, and then hide the eggs on the day of the event. We could apply for a People Partner grant to help with funds for either project."

The club can then ask the committee members various questions on their research, etc. and then a motion needs to be made for which project to do. Joe may say, "I move that we make tie blankets for the Care Center residents." The motion is then seconded and voted on.
