

Greetings, Glacier County 4-H!

Here are a few updates:

4-H Camp - Congratulations to Dayne Barbie, Hadley Barbie, Jacob Hjartarson, Katelyn Suta, and Josalyn Wilder for being selected as camp counselors, we're looking forward to having them on board! Given the potential headcount for camp, we've decided to split camp and have Glacier, Toole, Liberty, Pondera, and Chouteau counties camp for 1.5-2 days, and Hill, Phillips, and Blaine counties camp for 1.5-2 days. Camp will be June 14 - 17, 2021, and we'll let you know as soon as the schedule is set which of those days will be for Glacier county campers. Our counselors will be there for all four days.

Ag Committee - Congratulations to Tina McIlvain, Leanne Winkowitsch, and Brittany Hotchkiss for being elected Marias Fair Ag Committee president, secretary, and treasurer, respectively. We so appreciate your service on the committee! Kim Woodring is planning a painting day in the spring to finish the top of the Rabbit/Poultry barn and do some other touch up painting as well, this would be open to anyone.

Livestock - I'd encourage beef members to get a weight on those steers, we're nearly halfway through the feeding period to fair now. Remember, minimum weight is 1,100 pounds and maximum payweight is 1,500 pounds. Anyone is welcome to come use Kaleb and I's livestock scale if you'd like to motor down the Kevin Highway.

We received word this month that Lower Valley Processing was overbooked and unable to process our lambs, pigs, and goats this year. Vandevanter Meats in Columbia Falls has agreed to process those livestock for us. They also do Teton and Cascade county 4-H animals, with great reviews. I would encourage you to get processors for spare animals lined up as processing is tight.

Covid - 19 - Current Covid guidelines from MSU Extension include managing events or gatherings to accommodate CDC social distancing guidelines and follow local health directives regarding face masks. The Glacier County Board of Health does encourage mask wearing. Please continue to be diligent about hand washing as well. Montana 4-H is moving ahead with planning Congress for the MSU campus in July, with some modifications.

Communications Contest - The Council will be meeting this month to plan the county Communications Contest and we'll share those details when available. Everyone should plan to do a presentation within their club and/or at the county or fair level. Community Service - I have been so pleased to see all the wonderful ways our 4-Hers have been giving back to the community this year. Youth and adult partnerships

4-H strives to create successful youth-adult partnerships where youth are actively involved in planning and implementing. When this happens, youth are more likely to participate, they're able to share the viewpoints of their peers, and it helps grow youth into the next generation of leaders. Youth can have a fresh outlook on ideas for 4-H and adults leaders gain valuable human resources due to the sharing of responsibilities when partnerships are formed. Here are a few tips and tricks for creating effective youth-adult partnerships:

- Actively seek youth input, and be sure to listen to their ideas and ask questions
- Ensure that each adult and young person enters a partnership with a clear understanding of everyone's roles and responsibilities
- Be a good role model set a good example through language and actions, and set the same standards for youth.
- Set realistic expectations. Effective partnerships don't set young people up for failure by throwing them into situations for which they are not prepared.

State Award winners have gone above and beyond regular project work with a focus on leadership, communication, and community service. State Award recipients are recognized during the Banquet at Montana 4-H Congress in July and are eligible to attend National 4-H Congress in November. Livestock Deadlines:

Swine Weigh in April 11 - Deadline for weighing in/ tagging swine for the Marias Fair. Please coordinate • with a Kari a time to tag and deworm your pigs. We will assume each family will have one spare pig (for deworming). If you'll have more, please let us know so we can have the correct number of deworming syringes ready.

Breeding Project Info Due April 11 - Deadline for submitting breeding project information to the Extension Office. Breeding animals must be identifiable with 4-H Clover tattoo, Association Registration tattoo number, Bangs tag, or Scrapie tag. If no identifiable tattoo or tag is available, a picture may be submitted instead. The 4-H'er needs to have full possession of their project animal at this time.

Lamb Tagging May 9 - Deadline weighing in/tagging lambs for the Marias Fair.

For Weigh-ins - members need to know a starting weight, date of birth, breed, breeder's Name, and breeder's address when tagging livestock. We have a scale available if needed for getting a starting weight.

Reminders:

Swine must be a minimum of 220 pounds to sell at the Marias Fair and the maximum payweight is 300 pounds.

Lambs must be a minimum of 100 pounds to sell at the Marias Fair and the maximum payweight is 145 pounds.

Steers must be a minimum of 1,100 pounds and maximum the payweight is 1,500 pounds.

Livestock Quality Assurance training

Training is required for those in market livestock projects every other year in order to show and sell at the Marias Fair. If you need training, please plan to attend one of these options:

Parliamentary Procedure

This month we'll focus on voting and Division of the House. There are six ways that voting can occur during a meeting. They are:

- Voice vote This is the most common where, "All in favor, say Aye" and "All opposed, say Nay."
- Standing vote Members stand so their votes can be counted.
- Show of hands Members raise their right hand for their vote to be counted.
- Ballot Members vote by secret ballot, commonly used in elections.
- Roll call Members vote one at a time as their names are called by the secretary.
- Honor system Members close their eyes and vote by raising a hand.

If a member thinks that a vote was not correctly decided (for example, the president declares that the motion passed but a member thinks it should have actually failed, or vice versa) they can call a, "Division of the House." A 'division of the house' does not require a second, and cannot be amended or debated. Once a division of the house is called, the president has the members revote using a different voting method. For example, if they first voted using a voice vote, now they may revote using a show of hands or any of the other methods.
