

Law enforcement grant money distributed

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The Crow Tribe and Northern Cheyenne Tribe of Native Americans are listed on an August Grantee Report, dispersed by the Office of Community Policing Services, to receive money for hiring more police officers.

The Crow Tribe is slated to receive \$46,695 while the Northern Cheyenne Tribe is slated to

receive \$221,044.

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Under the U.S. Department of Justice's COPS program, law enforcement agencies apply for assistance to pay the salary and

benefits of officers over three years on a declining match basis, up to a maximum of \$75,000 per

alderman position. If he accepts candidacy for the fouryear term, an alderman candidate will be appointed for the two-year term. At least two votes are required for eligibility of candidacy in the General Election.

The Democrat write-in nominee for the two-year alderman position in Lodge Grass is Dawn LaFountain

with 41 votes.

In the Hardin Primary, there were no write-ins for the four-year or two-year alderman positions, making Harry Steinmetz, Jr. (REP), Karla Geck (DEM) and Robert Seder (DEM) the candidates for the four-year alderman term, and Carla Colstad the candidate for the two-year term.

According to Election Administrator Cyndy Maxwell, "If someone declares a candidacy for any of these terms prior to the General Election, write-ins who have not accepted will not count. If no one else declares candidacy for these positions, then all the write-in

votes will be counted."

The Hardin election 'ballot issue' resulted in 31 Democrats and 18 Republicans voting for the amended plan of government; while five from each political party voted for the existing form.
